Minister's Meditation

The Rev. Jennie Barrington, Interim Minister

"People wish to be settled; only as far as they are unsettled is there any hope for them." (Ralph Waldo Emerson)

Dear Members and Friends,

I am enjoying my time with all of you so much! I have been pleased to have more in-depth conversations with long-time members, and to begin to get to know the many new people who have joined UUCC since I began serving as the Interim Minister here, back in August of 2015. Now is a good time for a refresher on what an Interim Minister is and does.

When a minister has been settled in a congregation for several years, and then her or his ministry there ends, an Interim Minister is a good idea. There will be some things that the congregation has been doing the same way over and over again. The Interim Minister can help people try new things in new ways. And there will be some things that were done a variety of different ways, month to month, or even week to week. The Interim Minister can help establish some consistency. The Interim Minister comes in with fresh eyes. All congregations have found that to be a helpful perspective for them to self-assess how things are going at a unique point in the congregation's history. First and foremost is noticing and lifting up the things that are going well. We need to fan the flame of those things, so that they keep going well! Additionally, an Interim Minister works closely with the Board, and committees, and ad hoc task forces. That work includes setting goals and priorities, reviewing the bylaws, and clarifying the roles of minister, staff, and lay leaders.

As such, Interim Ministry is an additional layer on top of the usual work of ministering to a congregation (what we call "Parish Ministry"). I love it! A big part of my work is helping the congregation have a Search Process that is as much of a happy success as possible. Ideally, the Search Committee will chose one Candidate Minister to make an offer to, who will be a great fit to be the long-term minister of UUCC, and that Candidate Minister will say yes. Then he or she will come to UUCC this spring (often from the last weekend in April through the first weekend in May). During that week, the minister will preach and lead worship twice. And there will be amply time for everyone to attend "Meet and Greets," to ask any questions on your minds. At the end of that week, the members vote. And the vote needs to be at least 90% in favor for a minister to accept. All signs are looking great for UUCC's Search Process to be a happy success!

I'm reminding us about what Interim Ministry is so that you can ask me any questions you'd like to ask. The "interim work" that I described above is actually written into every interim minister's contract. It's called, "The Five Developmental Tasks" of Interim Ministry, and it includes:

- --assisting with claiming and honoring UUCC's past and healing its griefs and conflicts;
- --illuminating UUCC's identity, strengths, needs, and challenges;
- --clarifying the multiple dimensions of leadership, both ordained and lay, and navigating the shifts in leadership that accompany times of transition;
- --renewing connections with resources within and beyond the UUA; and
- --renewing UUCC's vision, strengthening its stewardship, preparing for new professional leadership, and helping members engage with UUCC's future with anticipation and zest.

No interim period would see the full completion of all of these tasks. But we have made great progress with them. Neither are they done in any one order. We can continue to talk about UUCC's past and its challenges. We will certainly continue to work on Leadership Development, something that all congregations, and non-profits, always want to do more of. We will continue to strengthen UUCC's relationship with staff and consultants from the UUA. And what I have enjoyed the most has been clarifying and strengthening our commitment to UUCC's stewardship, unique purpose in the wider community, and vision for its future.

So I hope that you will continue to talk with me about my role and responsibilities here, as your interim minister. Each congregation I have served has had some things that it does really well. UUCC has so many things it does really well that I continue to be motivated, inspired, and delighted to serve here with y'all.

She had the task of threading the yarn through the small holes punched in the paper tickets and tying knots to keep the ends together. A challenging endeavor even for those of us with lots of experience in knot tying. It was obvious she would need help. And then along comes one of our wonderful long time members who willingly sat and patiently helped thread and tie over 100 ballots!

The cooperation between the two was heartwarming. Learning from one another, working cooperatively, an otherwise overwhelming task became manageable and even enjoying. And the exchanges between the two were priceless. No one was an obvious lead and neither was the obvious student. It was an equal exchange of two people putting their heads together to get a task done and to get it done in a pleasant manner. One of the truly simple joys of being a valued member of our UUCC community and a life lesson for those of us not yet fully engaged. Lend your heart and soul to a community and experience the weightlessness of being lifted with love and support. It is truly a beautiful state of being.

I hope you all get to experience this over and over again in our halls and I dream that we can take this out into the world to sow as this is truly what makes our lives' journeys so worthwhile.

THINK OF A MINISTER. DON'T THINK OF AN ELEPHANT!

Chances are you thought of both. And distinct images perhaps came to mind. Despite good intentions and concerted effort, we often think of things that we tell ourselves not to think. In terms of a minister, what images come to your mind? Is it a person of a particular gender, race, or age?

In finding the person who would be the best match for our congregation, we could potentially overlook or even let biases keep us from knowing that a particular person would be the best match for us.

The *Beyond Categorical Thinking* workshop is a highly recommended part of the ministerial search process for our congregation. This program is over 20 years running, and seeks to address the very real discrimination ministers in our faith who are people of color, bisexual, gay, lesbian, female, transgendered, differently labeled, young, old, ethnically different, or of a different social class still face as part of a ministerial search. This program will provide us a chance to examine how we can avoid letting prejudice become a part of our search process.

In our continued efforts to find the best match, our congregation will host a *Beyond Categorical Thinking* workshop after the service on **Sunday**, **November 13**, with trainer, Amanda Schuber, from the UUA. Amanda will meet with the Search Committee on Saturday, lead the Sunday worship service, and then facilitate a 3-hour dialogue after church from 12:30 – 3:30 p.m. **Lunch will be provided.**

We hope the entire congregation will join us in this opportunity to help us fully participate in the search process. It will allow us to join together and explore our hopes and concerns for a new minister, learn more about the search process, and see how our own history (both personal and congregational) might interfere with our efforts in this search.

The attendees included members of the UU Animal Ministry and the UU congregation. It was coordinated with, and attended by, members of Columbia Veg and the Progressive Network. The number of folks who signed our "Welcome!" sheet was around 50, but an estimate of the number who actually attended (by Larry Siegel, UUCC's "official counter" on Sundays), was more in the neighborhood of 90-95!! We Have a Match!!

An Update on Your Capital Campaign

Those of you at the service last Sunday heard the great news about the campaign to renovate our building: we now have a matching challenge for \$30,000!!! Yes, a new couple, Quillin and Julie Davis, have seen our potential and offered us a chance to double our money; they will match dollar for dollar any pledges donated between October 23 and November 30 up to \$30,000. This includes increases in current Capital Campaign pledges. If you want to do an additional pledge, simply fill out another pledge card and write a big "2" at the top and tell us the details in the "Other" section.

This is a big "heads-up" for everyone who has been postponing their contribution to the Capital Campaign. Even if you have to wait until next year to write the check (maybe you're selling a house, taking an IRA distribution that will be tax-free if it goes to us, etc.), now's the time to make a pledge. Just indicate a date when you think the donation would happen. If we get your pledge card before November 30, it will be matched.

This is also the optimal time for everyone at the UUCC to contribute. We are printing some more pledge cards with the goal to get a pledge from everyone in the building: every man, woman, and child. We are asking CYRE teachers to discuss this with children and parents, with the understanding that no gift is too small. Wouldn't it be great if every child could say they helped make the RE wing beautiful? Wouldn't it be great if we could tell visitors and potential ministers that 100% of our congregation gave to renovate our building?

To say your Capital Campaign team is thrilled is an understatement! Including the pledges/checks we received last Sunday, which were all matched, we now have a total of \$128,453 in pledges. We have a real chance to hit our goal of \$175,000 and even surpass it, enabling us to do more. Even better, we could save a lot of money by hiring one contractor for everything---and begin work before we have potential ministers visiting next Spring. It's a great time to be at the UUCC!

Summary of August 17, 2016 Meeting

The Board of Trustees met August 17, 2016 from 6:30 to 8:50 PM.

Treasurer's Report

Bob Whitaker reported that July was a good month financially. Pledge payments were \$2,600 over our monthly expectation. Plate collections were higher than expected. We had anticipated collecting \$1,000 from un-met pledges for the 2015-16 budget year; we actually received \$1,230. Bob noted that there were five Sundays in July.

Committee Reports

David Roof is chair of the <u>Technology Services Committee</u>. The <u>Personnel Committee</u> is accepting applications for the custodial position. <u>Building and Grounds</u> has hired a contractor to work on our grounds. The <u>Finance Committee</u> plans to launch a Capital Campaign on September 25. The <u>CYRE</u> lost money on Hogwarts Camp this summer.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Brokerage Account The Board opened a brokerage account so we can receive gifts of stocks.

<u>Approval of Goals for 2016-17</u> During our all-day retreat on August 6, the Board developed goals for this fiscal year. They were refined slightly since that meeting and are listed below.

NEW BUSINESS

<u>Board Representative to Ministerial Search Negotiating Team</u> The Board selected Bob Whitaker to serve with Linda Brennison and David Crockett from the Search Committee on this Team. They will develop a draft ministry agreement that reflects the relationship the congregation hopes to have with the minister it calls. After the Board approves that draft, the Team will negotiate it with the ministerial candidate.

Appraisal of Interim Ministry It is time for another appraisal of the interim ministry to be sent to Boston (September 30 deadline). Rev. Jennie will prepare a draft of her appraisal by September 6 and share it with the Board. Board members will each complete a form and send it to Sandy Chubon who will compile the responses and return them to members before the September meeting. We will discuss the report at our September meeting.

<u>Sponsored Events Budget Procedure</u> A procedure has been developed for use this fiscal year to encourage better financial planning and control for sponsored events.

If expenditures for a UUCC sponsored event are predicted to exceed \$1,000, the sponsoring entity should: (1) designate a person responsible for administering the planning of the event and (2) submit a budget to the Administrator that includes estimated expenditures and income. The Administrator will forward this information to the Board President who will follow up with questions, if necessary.
