

Message From Our Minister "Dust of Snow"

The calendar signals that Winter officially begins in a few days. In Columbia, South Carolina, we have already experienced the signs of this season, with temperatures slipping into the 40's, and the beautiful colors of Autumn that provide the visual prelude to the winter landscape. When I say the words, "winter landscape," I think about snow covered hills and icicles hanging from trees, even though I have never lived in an area where snow was the common experience of this season. I don't imagine that Robert Frost was describing the Shandon neighborhood when he penned his poem, "Stopping by Woods on a Snowy Evening."

I do enjoy the short poem by Frost entitled, "Dust of Snow," as we move into this season of darkness and quiet:

"Dust of Snow" by Robert Frost

The way a crow Shook down on me The dust of snow From a hemlock tree

Has given my heart A change of mood And saved some part Of a day I had rued. i

Frost invites us into a day that often comes in the darkness of winter, a day of bitterness or depression. We don't often anticipate this season with great excitement. The presence of holidays and rituals can heighten the grief we find ourselves working through. Many can resonate with the author, who trudges through a day that he rues. Frost uses images and metaphors of fear and death as he employs the crow who has perched on the poisonous branches of a hemlock tree.

The poem, however, captures a moment of awakening provided by a simple act of nature. The crow shakes the branches of the tree and releases a dust of snow, a cold mood changer to the bitter day. The day gets saved by being outside, and immersing the self in an experience that would have been missed had the author been huddled around an indoor fire.

What a great reminder for us to stay connected to this web of existence around us, even in the midst of the "bleak midwinter." We should challenge ourselves to stand next to trees, feel the cold air, get close enough to birds to be impacted by their movements, and look up into the sky with hope. Let nature surprise us, especially on the days when sadness and depression creep into our lives. Let nature jolt us and change the mood on days we rue. I hope that we all have opportunities this winter to catch a dust of snow.

Congaree Riverkeeper is affiliated with the Waterkeeper Alliance, a global movement of on-the-water advocates who patrol and protect rivers and coasts all over the world.
