Pulpit Ponderings Rev. Jeff Liebmann

As a light-skinned person, it is sometimes difficult to know what to do to combat systemic racism in our country. While not rich, I have never been completely destitute. So, it is sometimes hard to know what to do to fight poverty in America. As a straight male, I sometimes think there is more I can do to challenge homophobia and transphobia in the United States. And as a man, I sometimes wonder what I can do to battle misogyny, domestic abuse, and sexual violence in our society.

Regardless of my situation, however, because I am a white, middle class, straight male in America, I have choices. I do not live in fear that a police stop will result in my death. I do not live in fear of homelessness, or having to choose between food, heat, or medical care. I do not live in fear of businesses discriminating against me because of who I love. And I certainly live in no fear of sex-based harassment or objectification. I never worry about how I am dressed in public, being out alone at night, or whether no will really mean no. I wish my wife, my daughters and granddaughters, and women friends could feel the same way.

The tragic reality, however, is this. Accused pedophile Roy Moore lost his bid to become a U.S. Senator yesterday. But his defeat was a narrow one, with well over 600,000 citizens of Alabama willing to put political party over substantial and disturbing allegations of abuse of women and teenage girls. And the President of the United States still stands accused of multiple counts of sexual misconduct and immoral treatment of women.

Men, perhaps we don't always know the most effective way to combat the dysfunctional treatment of women in America. But, we must do more.

We must avail ourselves of every opportunity to stand by women, supporting their empowerment and challenging systems of discrimination. We must educate every boy and man about the dangers and hypocrisy of patriarchal thinking. When women ask for our help, we must have the courage and the commitment to offer that assistance without reserve or revision, honoring their wisdom and respecting their wishes.

In this holiday season, let us remember the millions of women who helped build the nations, sustain our societies, held our communities together in times of disaster, and bore every child. And in the coming year, may we eliminate every barrier to equality faced by women, so they may blossom fully and enjoy all of the benefits our century offers.

Denominational Connections – December 2017

Social Justice is our middle name. Wherever there are issues that impact people who are marginalized, our environment, education, health care, environmental justice, the criminal justice system, voting rights, and many other issues, you will find Unitarian Universalists positioning themselves on the side of love. Many of us have our “favorite” social justice issues and we each take part, as we are able, in different ways, at different times, as individuals.

Our association of congregations also takes part in social justice issues as we come together over issues that impact our wider world or our neighbors right next door. *We are stronger together.* Since its merger in 1961 the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations has used a consistent process to explore the issues it will study and act on as an association and has decided by a voting process at its annual General Assemblies what those issues will be. The UUA makes two different types of social witness statements: Statements of Conscience (SOCs), which arise from Congregational Study/Action Issues, and Actions of Immediate Witness (AIWs). More information may be found here: <https://www.uua.org/action/process>. The delegates who go to General Assembly from our congregation each June are part of this process. Perhaps, most of the time, the issues that are chosen coincided with yours or perhaps, occasionally, you have felt that issues you support should have gotten more attention.

Wherever you have found yourself on the side of UUA social justice issues, you have a couple of unique upcoming opportunities. The UUA is re-thinking how it does social witness work and YOUR voice is important. Additionally, because the UUA is re-thinking its social witness process, the normal deadline of October 1st for submitting our congregational vote on the Congregational Study Action Issues (CSAIs) to be voted on next June has been extended. We will have an opportunity in early January to give our input on which CSAIs our delegates will vote on in June that all UU congregations will study and act on for the next 4 years. Anne Mellen, a member of the Denominational Connections Committee, will organize opportunities for you to come together, discuss the issues, and send our vote to the UUA. So, please stay tuned for more on this significant aspect of our Unitarian Universalist experience. Summary of October 18, 2017 Meeting

The Board of Trustees met October 18, 2017.

Treasurer's Report

Bob Whitaker reported that at the end of September our positive variance was \$4,439.92. The Capital Campaign Fund balance as of October 16, was \$119,631.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Building Renovations Bids were invited from six contractors; two have responded that they plan to bid on the project. Their bids are expected this week.

Confirmation of E-mail Votes It was noted that votes had been cast via e-mail to address these issues: the letter of agreement for the new Music Coordinator, the position description for the CYRE Assistant, hanging two banners on our building at the same time. All were approved.

UUCB Governance Report Follow Up Richard and Tim met with Rev Jeff recently to discuss how we might try implementing a different governance system. They suggested that we make some changes and try them out before we change our by-laws. Rev Jeff thinks these committees provide governance in our organization: Leadership Development, Endowment, Finance, Building & Grounds, Personnel, and Technology Services. These committees will continue to report to the Board of Trustees and they will have liaisons from the Board. All the remaining committees and program groups will constitute the ministry of our church; their chairs will report to Rev Jeff. He will be informed of their activities by their monthly reports; he will meet with all the committee chairs together at a frequency to be determined, perhaps quarterly.

The Board appointed liaisons to the committees as follows: Building & Grounds – Phil Turner; Endowment – Bob Whitaker; Leadership Development – Linda Brennison; Technology Services – Cheryl Soehl; Personnel – Emilio Perez-Jorge. Richard will serve as liaison to the Building Renovation Committee.

NEW BUSINESS

Green Committee Chair Kevin McKinney has volunteered to chair this committee this year. His offer was accepted.

UUCB Personnel Handbook Richard will ask the Personnel Committee to revise this document.

The Seven Principles of Unitarian Universalism

Grateful for the religious pluralism that enriches and ennobles our faith, we are inspired to deepen our understanding and expand our vision. We covenant to affirm and promote:

1. The inherent worth and dignity of every person
2. Justice, equity, and compassion in human relationships
3. Acceptance of one another and encouragement of spiritual growth in our congregations
4. A free and responsible search for truth and meaning
5. The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and society at large
6. The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all
